



**Gregory R. Elphinston**

*Director, Community Involvement, Nokia*

Gregory Elphinston is the director of community involvement at Nokia, responsible for the strategic direction of Nokia's social investments and partnerships worldwide. Prior to this position, he led the development of Nokia's first CSR report in 2004 and the progression of its CSR agenda in Latin America.

Mr. Elphinston commenced his career in 1994 as a lawyer, practicing in Australia and Great Britain. In 1998, he was appointed executive director of the European College of Sports Science, where he brought together corporate, government, and non-government organizations to advance the state of sports research. After returning to the corporate sector to lead the international channel sales team of Altium Ltd in 2000, Mr. Elphinston joined Nokia in 2001. At Nokia, he built partnerships for the construction of mobile communication networks in Asia, Latin America, and the U.S.

Mr. Elphinston holds a Master of Laws degree from the University of Queensland, Australia and received his bachelors degree from the Queensland University of Technology.



**Robert N. (Bo) Miller**

*Director, Corporate Citizenship and Global Contributions, The Dow Chemical Company*

Bo Miller is the public affairs director for corporate citizenship and global contributions for The Dow Chemical Company. He is responsible for identifying and proactively addressing corporate citizenship and governance issues relevant to the company, as well as developing and implementing the company's global philanthropy strategy. He chairs the Corporate Contributions Committee and is president and executive director of The Dow Chemical Company Foundation.

Mr. Miller joined Dow's Marketing Development Program in 1978 and has subsequently help various positions in personnel services, product marketing, sales, communications, business development, research, and more. He assumed responsibility for biotechnology public issues in November, 2001 and was named to his current position in June of 2004.

Mr. Miller holds a bachelor's degree in industrial marketing from Western Michigan University and has completed executive management curriculums at Indiana University and the University of Virginia. He is a member of the contributions council of the Conference Board, the advisory council of the Committee Encouraging Corporate Philanthropy, and the international advisory board of the Center for Corporate Citizenship at Boston College. He is also a board member of the West Midland Family Center, a nonprofit organization serving the quality of life needs of families in Midland County, MI.





**Daniel F. Runde**

*Head of Partnership Development, International Finance Corporation, The World Bank*

Daniel F. Runde is head of partnership development at the International Finance Corporation (IFC) - part of the World Bank Group. At IFC, Mr. Runde is responsible for building development partnerships with the private and corporate philanthropic communities.

From 2005 to 2007, Mr. Runde ran the Global Development Alliance (GDA) initiative at the US Agency for International Development (USAID). The GDA is USAID's business model, which seeks to make greater use of public-private partnerships for development. In its first four years, USAID brought \$1.4 billion to 400 public-private alliances and leveraged over

\$4.6 billion in partner contributions from companies, private philanthropy, faith-based groups, individual donors, and others. In November 2005, GDA was awarded the inaugural Lewis and Clark Prize for Innovation in Collaborative Governance at Harvard University and also recognized as a finalist in the Innovations in Government Program at Harvard University.

From 2002 to 2005, Mr. Runde was a senior advisor at the GDA Secretariat. Prior to joining the Bush Administration, Mr. Runde was an assistant vice president for business development with Citigroup in Buenos Aires, Argentina. He also worked for BankBoston Argentina's corporate foundation as a consultant. Earlier in his career, he was an investment banker with Alex. Brown & Sons.

He has served on various boards including Baltimore Reads, The Harvard Coop, Grupo Innova (a think-tank in Argentina), and the American Society of the River Plate (US-expatriate community foundation in Argentina). In a personal capacity, he currently serves on the board of directors of the Society for International Development's Washington Chapter.

Mr. Runde holds a master's in public policy from the Kennedy School of Government at Harvard University and graduated cum laude with a Bachelor of Arts in government from Dartmouth College. He is fluent in Spanish.
